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Some inequalities for unitarily invariant norms of matrices

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Abstract

This article aims to discuss inequalities involving unitarily invariant norms. We obtain a refinement of the inequality shown by Zhan. Meanwhile, we give an improvement of the inequality presented by Bhatia and Kittaneh for the Hilbert-Schmidt norm.

1. Introduction

Let $M_{m,n}$ be the space of $m \times n$ complex matrices and $M_n = M_{n,n}$. Let $\|\cdot\|$ denote any unitarily invariant norm on M_n . So, $\|UAV\| = \|A\|$ for all $A \in M_n$ and for all unitary matrices $U, V \in M_n$. For $A = (a_{ij}) \in M_n$, the Hilbert-Schmidt norm of A is defined by

$$\|A\|_{2} = \sqrt{\left(\sum_{i=1}^{n}\sum_{j=1}^{n}\left|a_{ij}\right|^{2}\right)} = \sqrt{tr|A|^{2}} = \sqrt{\sum_{j=1}^{n}s_{j}^{2}\left(A\right)},$$

where *tr* is the usual trace functional and $s_1(A) \ge s_2(A) \ge ... \ge s_{n-1}(A) \ge s_n(A)$ are the singular values of *A*, that is, the eigenvalues of the positive semidefinite matrix

 $|A| = (AA^*)^{\frac{1}{2}}$, arranged in decreasing order and repeated according to multiplicity. The Hilbert-Schmidt norm is in the class of Schatten norms. For $1 \le p < \infty$, the *Schatten p-norm* $\|\cdot\|_p$ is defined as

$$\|A\|_{p} = \left(\sum_{j=1}^{n} s_{j}^{p}(A)\right)^{1/p} = \left(tr|A|^{p}\right)^{1/p}.$$

For k = 1,...,n, the *Ky Fan k-norm* $\|\cdot\|_{(k)}$ is defined as

$$\|A\|_{(k)} = \sum\nolimits_{j=1}^k s_j \, (A).$$

It is known that these norms are unitarily invariant, and it is evident that each unitarily invariant norm is a symmetric guage function of singular values [1, p. 54-55].

Bhatia and Davis proved in [2] that if $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite and if $0 \le r \le 1$, then

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$$2 \left\| A^{1/2} X B^{1/2} \right\| \le \left\| A^r X B^{1-r} + A^{1-r} X B^r \right\| \le \left\| A X + X B \right\|.$$
(1.1)

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. In [3], Zhan proved that

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\| \le \frac{2}{t+2} \left\|A^{2}X + tAXB + XB^{2}\right\|,$$
(1.2)

for any unitarily invariant norm and real numbers r,t satisfying $1 \le 2r \le 3,-2 < t \le 2$. The case r = 1, t = 0 of this result is the well-known arithmetic-geometric mean inequality

$$2 \left\| A^{1/2} X B^{1/2} \right\| \le \|AX + XB\|.$$

Meanwhile, for $r \in [0,1]$, Zhan pointed out that he can get another proof of the following well-known Heinz inequality

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{1-r} + A^{1-r}XB^{r}\right\| \leq \left\|AX + XB\right\|$$

by the same method used in the proof of (1.2).

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite and suppose that

$$\psi(v) = \left\| A^{1+v} X B^{1-v} + A^{1-v} X B^{1+v} \right\|.$$
(1.3)

Then ψ is a convex function on [-1,1] and attains its minimum at $\nu = 0$ [4, p. 265]. In [5], for positive semidefinite $n \times n$ matrices, the inequality

$$\|AB\| \leqslant \frac{1}{4} \|(A+B)^2\|$$
(1.4)

was shown to hold for every unitarily invariant norm. Meanwhile, Bhatia and Kittaneh [5] asked the following.

Question

Let $A,B \in M_n$ be positive semidefinite. Is it true that

$$s_j(AB) \leq \frac{1}{4}s_j(A+B)^2, \ j = 1, 2, \cdots, n$$
?

The case *n* = 2 is known to be true [5]. (See also, [1, p. 133], [6, p. 2189-2190], [7, p. 198].)

Obviously, if $A, B \in M_n$ are positive semidefinite and AB = BA, then we have $j = 1, 2, \dots, n$, $j = 1, 2, \dots, n$.

2. Some inequalities for unitarily invariant norms

In this section, we first utilize the convexity of the function

$$\psi(r) = \left\| A^{r} X B^{2-r} + A^{2-r} X B^{r} \right\|$$

to obtain an inequality for unitarily invariant norms that leads to a refinement of the inequality (1.2). To do this, we need the following lemmas on convex functions.

Lemma 2.1

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. Then, for each unitarily invariant norm, the function

$$\psi\left(r\right) = \left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\|$$

is convex on [0,2] and attains its minimum at r = 1.

Proof

Replace ν +1 by r in (1.3).

Lemma 2.2

Let ψ be a real valued convex function on an interval [a,b] which contains (x_1,x_2) . Then for $x_1 \le x \le x_2$, we have

$$\psi(x) \le \frac{\psi(x_2) - \psi(x_1)}{x_2 - x_1} x - \frac{x_1 \psi(x_2) - x_2 \psi(x_1)}{x_2 - x_1}.$$
(2.1)

Proof

Since ψ is a convex function on [a,b], for $a \le x_1 \le x \le x_2 \le b$, we have

$$\frac{\psi\left(x_{1}\right)-\psi\left(x\right)}{x_{1}-x}\leq\frac{\psi\left(x_{2}\right)-\psi\left(x\right)}{x_{2}-x}.$$

This is equivalent to the inequality (2.1).

Theorem 2.1

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. If $1 \le 2r \le 3$ and $-2 < t \le 2$, then

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\| \le 2\left(2r_{0} - 1\right)\left\|AXB\right\| + \frac{4\left(1 - r_{0}\right)}{2+t}\left\|A^{2}X + tAXB + XB^{2}\right\|, (2.2)$$

where $r_0 = \min\{r, 2-r\}$.

Proof

If $\frac{1}{2}\leqslant r\leqslant 1$, then by Lemma 2.1 and Lemma 2.2, we have

$$\psi(r) \leq \frac{\psi(1) - \psi\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)}{1 - \frac{1}{2}}r - \frac{\frac{1}{2}\psi(1) - \psi\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)}{1 - \frac{1}{2}}.$$

That is

$$\psi(r) \le (2r-1)\psi(1) + 2(1-r)\psi\left(\frac{1}{2}\right).$$
(2.3)

It follows from (1.2) and (2.3) that

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\| \le 2\left(2r-1\right)\left\|AXB\right\| + \frac{4\left(1-r\right)}{2+t}\left\|A^{2}X + tAXB + XB^{2}\right\|.$$

If $1 \leq r \leq \frac{3}{2}$, then by Lemma 2.1 and Lemma 2.2, we have

$$\psi(r) \leq \frac{\psi\left(\frac{3}{2}\right) - \psi(1)}{\frac{3}{2} - 1}r - \frac{\psi\left(\frac{3}{2}\right) - \frac{3}{2}\psi(1)}{\frac{3}{2} - 1}.$$

That is

$$\psi(r) \le (3-2r)\psi(1) + 2(r-1)\psi\left(\frac{3}{2}\right).$$
 (2.4)

It follows from (1.2) and (2.4) that

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\| \le 2\left(3 - 2r\right)\left\|AXB\right\| + \frac{4\left(r - 1\right)}{2 + t}\left\|A^{2}X + tAXB + XB^{2}\right\|.$$

It is equivalent to the following inequality

$$\left\|A^{r}XB^{2-r} + A^{2-r}XB^{r}\right\| \leq 2\left(2r_{0} - 1\right)\left\|AXB\right\| + \frac{4\left(1 - r_{0}\right)}{2 + t}\left\|A^{2}X + tAXB + XB^{2}\right\|.$$

This completes the proof. \Box

Now, we give a simple comparison between the upper bound in (1.2) and the upper bound in (2.2).

$$\begin{aligned} &\frac{2}{2+t} \left\| A^2 X + tAXB + XB^2 \right\| - 2 \left(2r_0 - 1 \right) \left\| AXB \right\| - \frac{4 \left(1 - r_0 \right)}{2+t} \left\| A^2 X + tAXB + XB^2 \right\| \\ &= \frac{2 \left(2r_0 - 1 \right)}{2+t} \left\| A^2 X + tAXB + XB^2 \right\| - 2 \left(2r_0 - 1 \right) \left\| AXB \right\| \\ &\geq \frac{2 \left(2r_0 - 1 \right)}{2+t} \cdot \left(2 + t \right) \left\| AXB \right\| - 2 \left(2r_0 - 1 \right) \left\| AXB \right\| = 0. \end{aligned}$$

Therefore, Theorem 2.1 is a refinement of the inequality (1.2).

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. Then, for each unitarily invariant norm, the function

$$\varphi(v) = \left\| A^{v} X B^{1-v} + A^{1-v} X B^{v} \right\|$$

is a continuous convex function on [0,1] and attains its minimum at $v = \frac{1}{2}$. See [4, p. 265]. Then, by the same method above, we have the following result.

Theorem 2.2.[8]

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. If $0 \le v \le 1$, then

$$\left\|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu} + A^{1-\nu}XB^{\nu}\right\| \le 4r_0 \left\|A^{1/2}XB^{1/2}\right\| + (1-2r_0) \left\|AX + XB\right\|,$$

where $r_0 = \min\{\nu, 1-\nu\}$. This is a refinement of the second inequality in (1.1).

Next, we will obtain an improvement of the inequality (1.4) for the Hilbert-Schmidt norm. To do this, we need the following lemma.

$$||A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}|| \le ||AX||^{\nu}||XB||^{1-\nu}.$$

Theorem 2.3

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. If $0 \le \nu \le 1$, then

$$2 \left\| A^{\nu} X B^{1-\nu} \right\| + \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu} \right)^2 \le \sqrt{\|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} + 2 \left\| A^{\nu} X B^{1-\nu} \right\|^2}.$$

Proof

Let

$$S = \|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} + 2\|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\|^{2} - \left(2\|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\| + \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^{2}\right)^{2}$$

So,

$$\begin{split} S &= \|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} + 2 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\|^2 - 4 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\|^2 - \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^4 \\ &- 4 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\| \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^2 \\ &= \|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} - 2 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\|^2 - \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^4 \\ &- 4 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\| \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^2. \end{split}$$

By Lemma 2.3, we have

$$S \ge \|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} - 2\|AX\|^{2\nu} \|XB\|^{2(1-\nu)} - (\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu})^{4} -4 \|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\| (\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu})^{2}.$$

That is,

$$\begin{split} S &\geq \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu} \right)^{2} \left(\left(\|AX\|^{\nu} + \|XB\|^{1-\nu} \right)^{2} - \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu} \right)^{2} - 4 \left\| A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu} \right\| \right) \\ &= 4 \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu} \right)^{2} \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} \|XB\|^{1-\nu} - \left\| A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu} \right\| \right) \\ &\geq 0. \end{split}$$

Hence,

$$\|AX\|^{4\nu} + \|XB\|^{4(1-\nu)} + 2\|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\|^{2} \ge \left(2\|A^{\nu}XB^{1-\nu}\| + \left(\|AX\|^{\nu} - \|XB\|^{1-\nu}\right)^{2}\right)^{2}.$$

This completes the proof. \square

Let $A,B,X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite, for Hilbert-Schmidt norm, the following equality holds:

$$\|AX + XB\|_{2}^{2} = \|AX\|_{2}^{2} + \|XB\|_{2}^{2} + 2 \|A^{1/2}XB^{1/2}\|_{2}^{2}.$$

Taking $v = \frac{1}{2}$ in Theorem 2.3, and then we have the following result.

Theorem 2.4.[10]

Let $A, B, X \in M_n$ such that A and B are positive semidefinite. Then

$$2\left\|A^{1/2}XB^{1/2}\right\|_{2} + \left(\sqrt{\|AX\|_{2}} - \sqrt{\|XB\|_{2}}\right)^{2} \le \|AX + XB\|_{2}.$$

Bhatia and Kittaneh proved in [5] that if $A,B \in M_n$ are positive semidefinite, then

$$\left\|A^{3/2}B^{1/2} + A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\right\| \le \frac{1}{2} \left\|(A+B)^2\right\|.$$
(2.5)

Now, we give an improvement of the inequality (1.4) for the Hilbert-Schmidt norm.

Theorem 2.5

Let $A, B \in M_n$ be positive semidefinite. Then

$$\|AB\|_{2} + \frac{1}{2} \left(\sqrt{\|A^{3/2}B^{1/2}\|_{2}} - \sqrt{\|A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\|_{2}} \right)^{2} \le \frac{1}{4} \|(A+B)^{2}\|_{2}.$$

Proof

Let

$$X = A^{1/2}B^{1/2}$$

Then, by Theorem 2.4, we have

$$2\|AB\|_{2} + \left(\sqrt{\|A^{3/2}B^{1/2}\|_{2}} - \sqrt{\|A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\|_{2}}\right)^{2} \le \|A^{3/2}B^{1/2} + A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\|_{2}.$$
 (2.6)

It follows form (2.5) and (2.6) that

$$2\|AB\|_{2} + \left(\sqrt{\|A^{3/2}B^{1/2}\|_{2}} - \sqrt{\|A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\|_{2}}\right)^{2} \le \frac{1}{2}\|(A+B)^{2}\|_{2}.$$

That is,

$$\|AB\|_{2} + \frac{1}{2} \left(\sqrt{\|A^{3/2}B^{1/2}\|_{2}} - \sqrt{\|A^{1/2}B^{3/2}\|_{2}} \right)^{2} \le \frac{1}{4} \|(A+B)^{2}\|_{2}.$$

This completes the proof.□
