Compact operators on some Fibonacci difference sequence spaces

Abstract

In this paper, we characterize the matrix classes $(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ $(1 \le p < \infty)$, where $\ell_p(\widehat{F})$ is some Fibonacci difference sequence spaces. We also obtain estimates for the norms of the bounded linear operators L_A defined by these matrix transformations and find conditions to obtain the corresponding subclasses of compact matrix operators by using the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness.

1 Introduction and preliminaries

Let $\mathbb{N} = \{0, 1, 2, ...\}$ and \mathbb{R} be the set of all real numbers. We shall write \lim_k , \sup_k , \inf_k , and \sum_k instead of $\lim_{k\to\infty}$, $\sup_{k\in\mathbb{N}}$, $\inf_{k\in\mathbb{N}}$, and $\sum_{k=0}^{\infty}$, respectively. Let ω be the vector space of all real sequences $x = (x_k)_{k\in\mathbb{N}}$. By the term *sequence space*, we shall mean any linear subspace of ω . Let φ , ℓ_{∞} , c, and c_0 denote the sets of all finite, bounded, convergent and null sequences, respectively. We write $\ell_p = \{x \in \omega : \sum_k |x_k|^p < \infty\}$ for $1 \le p < \infty$. Also, we shall use the conventions that e = (1, 1, ...) and $e^{(n)}$ is the sequence whose only non-zero term is 1 in the *n*th place for each $n \in \mathbb{N}$. For any sequence $x = (x_k)$, let $x^{[n]} = \sum_{k=0}^n x_k e^{(k)}$ be its *n*-section. Moreover, we write *bs* and *cs* for the sets of sequences with bounded and convergent partial sums, respectively.

A *B*-space is a complete normed space. A topological sequence space in which all coordinate functionals π_k , $\pi_k(x) = x_k$, are continuous is called a *K*-space. A *BK*-space is defined as a *K*-space which is also a *B*-space, that is, a *BK*-space is a Banach space with continuous coordinates. A *BK*-space $X \supset \varphi$ is said to have *AK* if every sequence $x = (x_k) \in X$ has a unique representation $x = \sum_k x_k e^{(k)}$. For example, the space ℓ_p $(1 \le p < \infty)$ is *BK*-space with $||x||_p = (\sum_k |x_k|^p)^{1/p}$ and c_0 , c, and ℓ_∞ are *BK*-spaces with $||x||_\infty = \sup_k |x_k|$. Further, the *BK*-spaces c_0 and ℓ_p have *AK*, where $1 \le p < \infty$ (*cf.* [1]).

A sequence (b_n) in a normed space X is called a *Schauder basis* for X if for every $x \in X$ there is a unique sequence (α_n) of scalars such that $x = \sum_n \alpha_n b_n$, *i.e.*, $\lim_m ||x - \sum_{n=0}^m \alpha_n b_n|| = 0$.

The β -dual of a sequence space *X* is defined by

$$X^{\beta} = \left\{ a = (a_k) \in \omega : ax = (a_k x_k) \in cs \text{ for all } x = (x_k) \in X \right\}$$

Let $A = (a_{nk})_{n,k=0}^{\infty}$ be an infinite matrix of real numbers a_{nk} , where $n, k \in \mathbb{N}$. We write A_n for the sequence in the *n*th row of *A*, that is, $A_n = (a_{nk})_{k=0}^{\infty}$ for every $n \in \mathbb{N}$. In addition, if $x = (x_k)_{k=0}^{\infty} \in \omega$ then we define the *A*-transform of *x* as the sequence $Ax = \{A_n(x)\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$, where

$$A_n(x) = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} a_{nk} x_k \quad (n \in \mathbb{N})$$

provided the series on the right side converges for each $n \in \mathbb{N}$.

For arbitrary subsets *X* and *Y* of ω , we write (*X*, *Y*) for the class of all infinite matrices that map *X* into *Y*. Thus, $A \in (X, Y)$ if and only if $A_n \in X^\beta$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N}$ and $Ax \in Y$ for all $x \in X$.

The matrix domain X_A of an infinite matrix A in sequence space X is defined by

 $X_A = \left\{ x = (x_k) \in \omega : Ax \in X \right\}$

which is a sequence space.

The following results are very important in our study [2, 3].

Lemma 1.1 Let $X \supset \phi$ and Y be BK-spaces.

- (a) Then we have $(X, Y) \subset \mathcal{B}(X, Y)$, that is, every matrix $A \in (X, Y)$ defines an operator $L_A \in \mathcal{B}(X, Y)$ by $L_A(x) = Ax$ for all $x \in X$.
- (b) If X has AK, then B(X, Y) ⊂ (X, Y), that is, for every operator L ∈ B(X, Y) there exists a matrix A ∈ (X, Y) such that L(x) = Ax for all x ∈ X.

The *Fibonacci numbers* are the sequence of numbers $\{f_n\}_{n=0}^{\infty}$ defined by the linear recurrence equations

$$f_0 = f_1 = 1$$
 and $f_n = f_{n-1} + f_{n-2}; n \ge 2.$

Fibonacci numbers have many interesting properties and applications in arts, sciences and architecture. For example, the ratio sequences of Fibonacci numbers converge to the golden ratio which is important in sciences and arts. Also, some basic properties of Fibonacci numbers can be found in [4].

Throughout, let $1 \le p \le \infty$ and q denote the conjugate of p, that is, q = p/(p-1) for $1 , <math>q = \infty$ for p = 1 or q = 1 for $p = \infty$.

Recently, in [5] and [6], the Fibonacci difference sequence spaces $\ell_p(\widehat{F})$ and $\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F})$ have been defined as follows:

$$\ell_p(\widehat{F}) = \left\{ x = (x_n) \in \omega : \sum_n \left| \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} x_n - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} x_{n-1} \right|^p < \infty \right\}; \quad 1 \le p < \infty$$

and

$$\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F}) = \left\{ x = (x_n) \in \omega : \sup_{n \in \mathbb{N}} \left| \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} x_n - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} x_{n-1} \right| < \infty \right\}.$$

Using the notation of the matrix domain, the sequence spaces $\ell_p(\widehat{F})$ and $\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F})$ may be redefined by

$$\ell_p(\widehat{F}) = (\ell_p)_{\widehat{F}} \quad (1 \le p < \infty) \quad \text{and} \quad \ell_\infty(\widehat{F}) = (\ell_\infty)_{\widehat{F}}, \tag{1.1}$$

where the matrix $\widehat{F} = (\widehat{f}_{nk})$ is defined by

$$\widehat{f}_{nk} = \begin{cases} -\frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} & (k = n-1), \\ \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} & (k = n), \\ 0 & (0 \le k < n-1) \text{ or } (k > n) \end{cases}$$
(1.2)

Further, it is clear that the spaces $\ell_p(\widehat{F})$ and $\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F})$ are *BK* spaces with the norms given by

$$\|x\|_{\ell_{p}(\widehat{F})} = \left(\sum_{n} |y_{n}(x)|^{p}\right)^{1/p}; \quad (1 \le p < \infty) \text{ and } \|x\|_{\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F})} = \sup_{n \in \mathbb{N}} |y_{n}(x)|, \tag{1.3}$$

where the sequence $y = (y_n) = (\widehat{F}_n(x))$ is the \widehat{F} -transform of a sequence $x = (x_n)$, *i.e.*,

$$y_n = \widehat{F}_n(x) = \begin{cases} \frac{f_0}{f_1} x_0 = x_0 & (n = 0), \\ \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} x_n - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} x_{n-1} & (n \ge 1) \end{cases}$$
(1.4)

2 Methods of measure of noncompactness

The first measure of noncompactness, the function α , was defined and studied by Kuratowski [7] in 1930. Darbo [8] used this measure to generalize both the classical Schauder fixed point principle and (a special variant of) the Banach contraction mapping principle for so-called condensing operators. The Hausdorff or ball measure of noncompactness χ was introduced by Goldenštein *et al.* [9] in 1957, and later studied by Goldenštein and Markus [10].

Let *X* and *Y* be infinite dimensional Banach spaces. We recall that a linear operator *L* from *X* into *Y* is called *compact* if its domain is all of *X* and, for every bounded sequence (x_n) in *X*, the sequence the sequence $(L(x_n))$ has a convergent subsequence. We denote the class of all compact operators in $\mathcal{B}(X, Y)$ by $\mathcal{C}(X, Y)$.

Let (X, d) be a metric space, $x_0 \in X$ and r > 0. Then we write, as usual, $B(x, r) = \{x \in X : d(x, x_0) < r\}$ for the open ball of radius r and center x_0 . Let \mathcal{M}_X denote the class of all bounded subsets of X. If $Q \in \mathcal{M}_X$, then the *Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of the set Q*, denoted by $\chi(Q)$, is defined by

$$\chi(Q) = \inf \left\{ \epsilon > 0 : Q \subset \bigcup_{k=1}^{n} B(x_k, r_k), x_k \in X, r_k < \epsilon (k = 1, 2, \ldots), n \in \mathbb{N} \right\}.$$

The function $\chi : \mathcal{M}_X \to [0, \infty)$ is called the *Hausdorff measure of noncompactness*.

The basic properties of the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness can be found in [3, 11–14].

Now we recall the definition of the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness operators between Banach spaces. Let *X* and *Y* be Banach spaces and χ_1 and χ_2 be the Hausdorff

measures of noncompactness on *X* and *Y*, respectively. An operator $L : X \to Y$ is said to be (χ_1, χ_2) -*bounded* if $L(Q) \in \mathcal{M}_Y$ for all $Q \in \mathcal{M}_X$ and there exists a constant $C \ge 0$ such that $\chi_2(L(Q)) \le C\chi_1(Q)$ for all $Q \in \mathcal{M}_X$. If an operator *L* is (χ_1, χ_2) -bounded then the number

$$||L||_{(\chi_1,\chi_2)} = \inf \{ C \ge 0 : \chi_2(L(Q)) \le C \chi_1(Q) \text{ for all } Q \in \mathcal{M}_X \}$$

is called the (χ_1, χ_2) -measure of noncompactness of L. If $\chi_1 = \chi_2 = \chi$, then we write $\|L\|_{(\chi_1,\chi_2)} = \|L\|_{\chi}$.

Now we outline the applications of the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness to the characterization of compact operators between Banach spaces. Let *X* and *Y* be Banach spaces and $L \in \mathcal{B}(X, Y)$. Then the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of *L* is given by ([14], Theorem 2.25)

$$\|L\|_{\chi} = \chi\left(L(S_X)\right) \tag{2.1}$$

and L is compact if and only if ([14], Corollary 2.26 (2.58))

$$\|L\|_{\chi} = 0. \tag{2.2}$$

The identities in (2.1) and (2.2) reduce the characterization of compact operators $L \in \mathcal{B}(X, Y)$ to the determination of the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness $\chi(Q)$ of bounded sets Q in a Banach space X. If X has a Schauder basis, then there exist estimates or even identities for $\chi(Q)$.

Theorem 2.1 ([9] or [14], Theorem 2.23) Let X be a Banach space with a Schauder basis $(b_k)_{k=0}^{\infty}$, $Q \in \mathcal{M}_X$, $\mathcal{P}_n : X \to X$ be the projectors onto the linear span of $\{b_0, b_1, \ldots, b_n\}$ and $\mathcal{R}_n = I - \mathcal{P}_n$ for $n = 0, 1, \ldots$, where I denotes the identity map on X. Then we have

$$\frac{1}{a} \cdot \limsup_{n \to \infty} \left(\sup_{x \in Q} \left\| \mathcal{R}_n(x) \right\| \right) \le \chi(Q) \le \limsup_{n \to \infty} \left(\sup_{x \in Q} \left\| \mathcal{R}_n(x) \right\| \right),$$

where $a = \limsup_{n \to \infty} \|\mathcal{R}_n\|$.

In particular, the following result shows how to compute the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness in the spaces c_0 and ℓ_p ($1 \le p < \infty$), which are *BK*-spaces with *AK*.

Theorem 2.2 ([14], Theorem 2.15) Let Q be a bounded subset of the normed space X, where X is ℓ_p for $1 \le p < \infty$ or c_0 . If $P_n : X \to X$ is the operator defined by $\mathcal{P}_n(x) = x^{[n]}$ for all $x = (x_k)_{k=0}^{\infty} \in X$ and $\mathcal{R}_n = I - \mathcal{P}_n$ for n = 0, 1, ..., then we have

$$\chi(Q) = \lim_{n \to \infty} \left(\sup_{x \in Q} \left\| \mathcal{R}_n(x) \right\| \right).$$
(2.3)

Since matrix mappings between *BK* spaces define bounded linear operators between these spaces which are Banach spaces, it is natural to use the above results and the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness to obtain necessary and sufficient conditions for matrix operators between *BK* spaces with a Schauder basis or *AK* to be compact operators. This

technique has recently been used by several authors in many research papers (see for instance [15–25]). In this paper, we characterize the matrix classes $(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and obtain an identity for the norms of the bounded linear operators L_A defined by these matrix transformations. We also find conditions to obtain the corresponding subclasses of compact matrix operators by using the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness.

3 Main results

In [26], the classes $(\ell_p(\widehat{F}), Y)$, $(\ell_{\infty}(\widehat{F}), Y)$, $(\ell_1(\widehat{F}), Y)$, $Y = \ell_{\infty}, c_0, c$, and $(\ell_p(\widehat{F}), \ell_1)$, $(\ell_1(\widehat{F}), \ell_p)$ of compact operators were characterized. In this paper, we characterize the classes $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p^{\lambda})$ for $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and compute the norm of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p^{\lambda})$. We also apply the results of the previous section to determine the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p^{\lambda})$, and to characterize the classes $\mathcal{C}(\ell_1, \ell_p)$ for $1 \le p < \infty$.

Here we characterize the classes $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and compute the norm of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$. We also apply the results of the previous section to determine the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ and to characterize the classes $\mathcal{C}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $1 \le p < \infty$.

The following result is useful.

Lemma 3.1 ([14], Theorem 3.8) Let T be a triangle and X and Y be arbitrary subsets of ω .

- (a) Then we have $A \in (X, Y_T)$ if and only if $C = T \cdot A \in (X, Y)$, where C denotes the matrix product of T and A.
- (b) If X and Y are B spaces and $A \in (X, Y_T)$ then

$$\|L_A\| = \|L_C\|. (3.1)$$

First we establish the characterizations of the classes $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and an identity for the operator norm.

Theorem 3.1 Let $1 \le p < \infty$.

(a) We have $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ if and only if there exists an infinite matrix $A \in (\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ such that

$$||A|| = \sup_{k} \left(\sum_{n} \left| \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} a_{nk} - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} a_{n-1,k} \right|^p \right)^{1/p} < \infty$$
(3.2)

and

$$L(x) = Ax \quad for \ all \ x \in \ell_1. \tag{3.3}$$

(b) If $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ then

$$\|L\| = \|A\|. \tag{3.4}$$

Proof Since ℓ_1 is a *BK* space with *AK* it follows from Lemma 1.1 that $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $1 \le p < \infty$ if and only if there exists an infinite matrix $A \in (\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ such that (3.3) holds.

Also we have by Lemma 3.1(a) that $A \in (\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ if and only if $C = \widehat{F} \cdot A \in (\ell_1, \ell_p)$, where the matrix $C = (c_{nk})$ is defined by

$$c_{nk} = \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} a_{nk} - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} a_{n-1,k}.$$

Furthermore, we have by [2], Example 8.4.1D, $C \in (\ell_1, \ell_p)$ if and only if

$$||C|| = \sup_{k} \left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |c_{nk}|^{p} \right)^{1/p} < \infty.$$

This completes the proof of part (a).

(b) If $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p^{\lambda})$ then it follows from (3.1) that $||L|| = ||L_C||$, where $L_C \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p)$ is given by $L_C(x) = Cx$ for all $x \in \ell_1$. It follows by the Minkowski inequality that

$$\begin{split} \|L_C(x)\|_p &= \left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} \left|\sum_{k=0}^{\infty} c_{nk} x_k\right|^p\right)^{1/p} \le \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} |x_k| \left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |c_{nk}|^p\right)^{1/p} \\ &\le \|C\| \cdot \|x\| = \|A\| \cdot \|x\|, \end{split}$$

and so

$$\|L\| \le \|A\|. \tag{3.5}$$

We also obtain for $e^{(k)} \in S_{\ell_1}$ $(k \in \mathbb{N})$

$$\left\|L_C(e^{(k)})\right\| = \left(\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |c_{nk}|^p\right)^p,$$

and so $||L|| \ge ||A||$. This and (3.5) yield (3.4).

This completes the proof.

Now we are going to establish a formula for the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$. We need the following result.

Lemma 3.2 ([1], Theorem 4.2) Let X be a linear metric space with a translation invariant metric, T be a triangle and χ , and χ_T denote the Hausdorff measures of noncompactness on \mathcal{M}_X and \mathcal{M}_{X_T} , respectively. Then $\chi_T(Q) = \chi(TQ)$ for all $Q \in \mathcal{M}_{X_T}$.

Theorem 3.2 Let $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and A denote the matrix which represents L. *Then we have*

$$\|L\|_{\chi_{\ell_p(\widehat{F})}} = \lim_{m \to \infty} \left(\sup_k \sum_{n=m}^{\infty} \left| \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} a_{jk} - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} a_{j-1,k} \right|^p \right)^{1/p}.$$
(3.6)

Proof We write $S = S_{\ell_1}$, for short, and $C^{[m]}$ ($m \in \mathbb{N}$) for the matrix with the rows $C_n^{[m]} = 0$ for $0 \le n \le m$ and $C_n^{[m]} = C_n$ for $n \ge m + 1$. It follows from (2.1), Lemma 3.2, (2.3), (3.4),

and (3.2) that

$$\begin{split} \|L\|_{\chi_{\ell_{p}(\widehat{F})}} &= \chi_{\ell_{p}(\widehat{F})} \big(L(S) \big) = \chi_{\ell_{p}} \big(L_{C}(S) \big) = \lim_{m \to \infty} \left(\sup_{x \in S} \left\| \mathcal{R}_{m}(Cx) \right\|_{p} \right) \\ &= \lim_{m \to \infty} \left(\sup_{x \in S} \left\| C^{[m]} x \right\|_{p} \right) = \lim_{m \to \infty} \left\| C^{[m]} \right\| \\ &= \lim_{m \to \infty} \left(\sup_{k} \sum_{n=m+1}^{\infty} \left| \frac{f_{n}}{f_{n+1}} a_{jk} - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_{n}} a_{j-1,k} \right|^{p} \right)^{1/p}. \end{split}$$

This completes the proof.

Finally, the characterization of $C(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ is an immediate consequence of Theorem 3.2 and (2.2).

Theorem 3.3 Let $L \in \mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and A denote the matrix which represents L. Then L is compact if and only if

$$\lim_{m \to \infty} \left(\sup_{k} \sum_{n=m}^{\infty} \left| \frac{f_n}{f_{n+1}} a_{jk} - \frac{f_{n+1}}{f_n} a_{j-1,k} \right|^p \right) = 0.$$

4 Conclusions

The Hausdorff measure of noncompactness can be most effectively used to characterize compact operators between Banach spaces. We have shown how the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness could be applied in the characterization of compact matrix operators between *BK* spaces. Here we characterized the classes $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $(1 \le p < \infty)$ and computed the norm of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$. We also determined the Hausdorff measure of noncompactness of operators in $\mathcal{B}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ and then characterized the classes $\mathcal{C}(\ell_1, \ell_p(\widehat{F}))$ for $1 \le p < \infty$.
